

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of these presentations the attendee should be able to:

- Review the current uses of botulinum toxin for the treatment of facial rhytides and the associated risks and benefits.
- Describe the new devices used for facial rejuvenation, the risks of using them, and how they compare to older modalities.
- Discuss the use of a variety of dermal fillers in both on-label and off-label locations.
- Outline the medical uses and possible adverse events of photodynamic therapy for the treatment of cutaneous malignancies and cosmetic procedures.
- Acquire expertise in using radiologic imaging to evaluate benign and malignant skin lesions and to assess skin cancer spread to distant organs.
- Discuss the current approach to evaluation/staging and management of early CTCL disease.
- Review the inadequacy of clinical diagnosis without pathologic confirmation and the benefits of pathologic confirmation in treating certain dermatoses.
- Describe flaps and grafts used for closure of defects and strategies for optimal closure of surgical wounds.
- Outline the techniques used to avoid adverse cosmetic outcomes when performing dermatologic reconstructive surgery for treatment of cutaneous malignancies.
- Discuss the latest epidemiological findings regarding Vitamin D levels and associations with systemic disease.
- Identify logical approaches to the treatment of rare cutaneous malignancies including surgical and medical interventions.
- Discuss a logical evidence based approach for treatment of melanoma.
- Present the latest epidemiological data and treatment options for the progression of actinic keratoses to malignancy.
- List the different clinical courses and presentations of cutaneous squamous cell carcinoma.
- At the end of the patient viewing and discussion sessions, participants will be better able to diagnose rare and complicated skin diseases.
